



# 2024 AP<sup>®</sup> Japanese Language and Culture

Exam Overview



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This is an overview of the AP Japanese Language and Culture Exam. This presentation will provide you with a preview of the question types and directions screens that you'll see on exam day.

The exam is administered in school on school-owned and -controlled computers through an exam application.

On exam day, you'll follow directions spoken by the proctor. During various parts of the exam, you'll also read on the screen, listen through a headset, type using the keyboard, and speak into a microphone. Read the information on the screens carefully.

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# Exam Format

The exam will take approximately two hours and 15 minutes to complete. The exam has two sections. This includes a 10-minute break between Sections I and II.

Section I consists of multiple-choice content.

- Part A: Listening
- Part B: Reading

Section II, the free-response section, requires you to produce written and spoken responses.

- Part A: Writing
- Part B: Speaking

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# About This Presentation

- This overview does not present an entire exam but does include questions that represent the various parts of the regular exam.
- The screen images in this presentation are from the practice exam, which is available through the exam application. Some screen images in this presentation include an Exit Part button, but this button will not appear in the regular exam.
- This presentation includes screens where some details, such as references to the number of questions or administration time, refer to the practice exam and do not match the regular exam.

## General Directions

The first section of the exam is multiple choice and tests your ability to use Japanese in the interpretive mode of communication. It contains several listening and reading tasks. In this section, choose one answer by selecting the oval  or anywhere on the answer choice. To change an answer, select a different answer choice. To leave a question unanswered after you have selected it, select the answer choice again to deselect it. The total score on the multiple-choice section is based only on the number of questions answered correctly. Points are not deducted for incorrect answers or unanswered questions.

The second section of the exam contains four free-response tasks, which test your ability to use Japanese in the interpersonal and presentational modes of communication. You will type your responses for the writing tasks, and you'll record your responses for the speaking tasks.

Various tasks in the exam will also test your knowledge of Japanese culture.

The proctor should have provided you with scratch paper and a pencil, which you may use to take notes and to organize your responses. You must return the scratch paper and pencil to the proctor at the end of the exam.

### At a Glance

The following table provides an overview of the the exam. It shows the number of questions, the amount of time for each part, and the contribution of each part to the final AP score. The total time listed for each section considers time for reading directions, moving from question to question, etc. As a result, the estimated time for each section may be greater than the sum of the estimated times for each part.

**Note:** The directions throughout the exam regarding timing for specific questions reflect the standard timing. If you have been approved for extended time or other accommodation that results in different timing, the adjusted time for applicable parts of the exam will be reflected accurately on the clock that appears on the screen.

You will hear a selection in Japanese. This selection will play once. You may take notes as you listen. Your notes will not be graded. After listening to the selection, you will be presented with questions in English. For each question, choose the response that is best according to the selection. You will have 12 seconds (standard time) to answer each question.

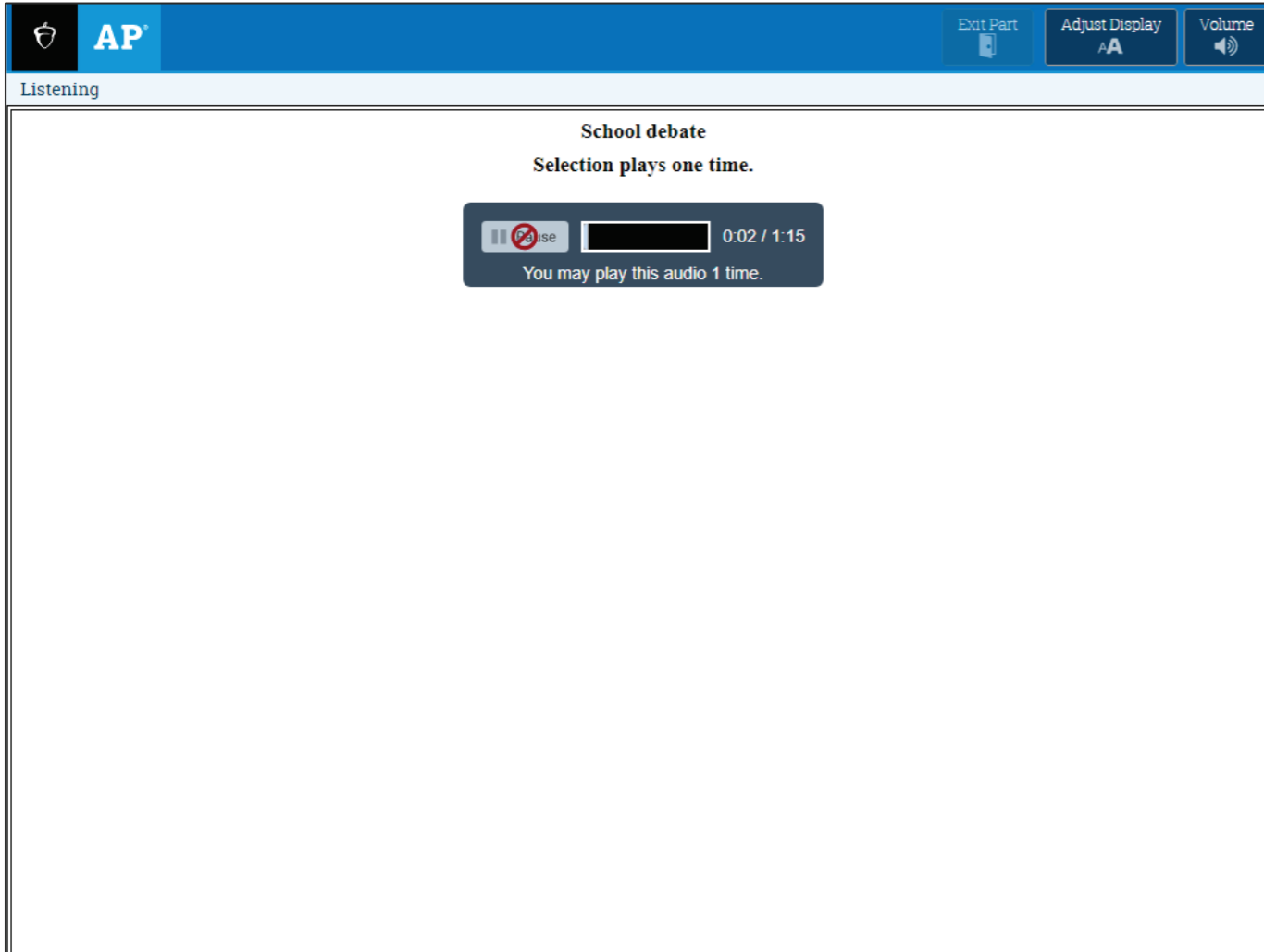
A clock will indicate how much time is remaining to answer the question.

When the response time has ended, you will automatically go on to the next question. You cannot return to previous questions.

You will now begin this part.

Select **Continue** to go on.

The multiple-choice section begins with Part A: Listening.

Reading

### Reading Part Directions

You will read a selection in Japanese. This selection is accompanied by a number of questions in English. For each question, choose the response that is best according to the selection.

You will have **10 minutes** (standard time) to answer all the questions. A clock on the screen will indicate how much time is remaining.

You can move to the next question by selecting **Next**. You can skip questions and go back to them later as long as there is time remaining. If you want to return to previous questions, select **Back**.

To mark a question for later review, select **Mark**. This will place a check mark in the Marked column on the review screen for that question. Selecting **Mark** again will remove the check mark. A question will remain marked until you unmark it, even if you change the answer.

You can select **Review** at any time, and the review screen will indicate which questions you have answered and which you have not answered. The Marked column indicates all questions you have marked for review. From the review screen, you may go directly to any question.

You will now begin this part.

Select **Continue** to go on.

The multiple-choice section continues with Part B: Reading.

During the Reading part, you can access the **Help** screens for support.

**NOTE:** The clock does not stop when viewing the **Help** screens. The more time you spend on **Help**, the less time you have to answer questions.

### Testing Tools

Next →	After you answer a question, select <b>Next</b> . You may still return to the question and change your answer after selecting <b>Next</b> .
Back ←	Selecting <b>Back</b> will take you to the previous screen or question.
Help ?	Selecting <b>Help</b> will bring you to Help. From Help you can get information on different topics by selecting one of the tabs on the screen. You are now in Help.
Review	Selecting <b>Review</b> will open the Review screen. The Review screen lists all of the questions in the Reading part and their status. The Status column indicates if a question has been answered, not answered, or not encountered. The Mark column shows all questions you have marked for review. The question you were on last is selected and highlighted when you enter the Review screen.
Mark	Selecting <b>Mark</b> will place a check mark on the Review screen next to the questions you may want to review again. Selecting <b>Mark</b> again will remove the check mark. A question will remain marked until you unmark it, even if you change the answer.
Exit Part	<b>Exit Part</b> is only active for the practice exam. This button won't appear in the regular exam. Selecting <b>Exit Part</b> will skip ahead to the next part of the practice exam.

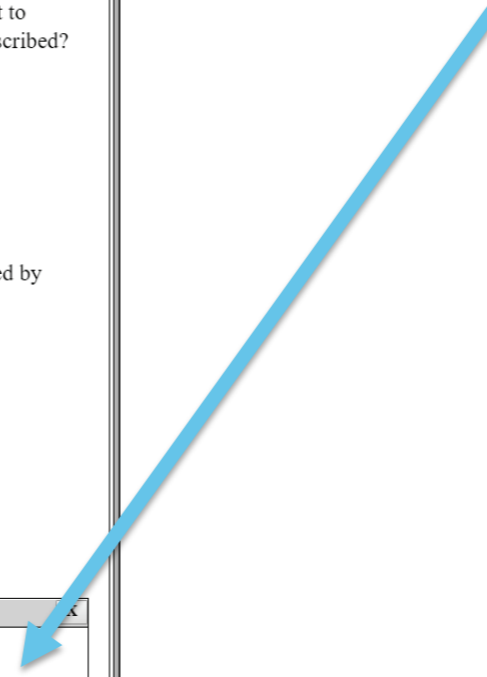

### Review

**Writing Part Directions**

You will participate in a simulated exchange of text-chat messages.

The input method for typing Japanese text is the Google Japanese IME, which allows you to type in different modes. To produce hiragana (あ), type in romaji and press the **Enter** key. To convert a typed word to katakana (ア) or kanji, type in romaji and press the **space bar**, which displays a list of options for katakana and kanji. Choose the desired option by pointing and selecting with the mouse or by using the **up** and **down arrows** and pressing the **Enter** key. If you need to produce English letters, such as "ATM", press and hold the **Shift** key while typing the letters, then press the **Enter** key. Releasing the **Shift** key returns you to the Japanese IME. Note that you should use English letters only in cases where they would normally be used in authentic Japanese writing. Do not use romaji or English as a substitute for words that should be written in Japanese.

For this task, you will have a specific amount of response time. A clock on the screen will indicate how much time is remaining.

When the response time has ended, you will proceed to the next question. You cannot return to previous questions.

Select **Continue** to go on.

The free-response section begins with Part A: Writing.

During the Writing part, you can access the **Help** screens for support.

**NOTE:** The clock does not stop when viewing the **Help** screens. The more time you spend on **Help**, the less time you have to answer questions.

### Writing Tools Information

This is an overview of the writing tools and keyboard keys available to you during the exam. These tools and keys will help you write your essay.

**Tools:**

**Cut**—To delete something you have typed or cut it to paste elsewhere:

- select the text
- select **Cut**

**Paste**—To put text in a different location:

- select the text
- select **Cut**
- go to the spot where you want to place the text
- select **Paste**
- **Note:** You can only **Cut** and **Paste** within a response to a question, not between responses to different questions.

**Undo**—select **Undo** to reverse or cancel your last action. Each time you select **Undo**, it reverses one more action.

**Redo**—select **Redo** to reverse the action of the **Undo** command. Each time you select **Redo**, it reverses one more **Undo** command.

**Character Count**—select **Hide Character Count** to remove the character count. Select **Show Character Count** to show the character count.

### Writing Part Directions: Text Chat

You will participate in a simulated exchange of text-chat messages. Each time it is your turn to write, you will have 90 seconds (standard time) to respond. You should respond as fully and as appropriately as possible.

There will be six times when it is your turn to write.

You will now begin this part.

Select **Continue** to go on.

**NOTE:** Pressing and holding **Shift** or enabling the **Caps Lock** will make the text appear in English.

When the response time has ended, you will automatically go on to the next question. You cannot return to previous questions.

Your cue to start speaking will always be this tone.

The free-response section continues with Part B: Speaking.

Before beginning this part, you will perform another headset and microphone check.

You should record your responses at a normal speaking level.

You will participate in a simulated conversation. Each time it is your turn to speak, you will have 20 seconds (standard time) to record. You should respond as fully and as appropriately as possible.

There will be four times when it is your turn to speak.

You will now begin this part.

Select **Continue** to go on.



**Directions:** You will participate in a simulated conversation. You will hear a series of 4 questions or statements; after each question or statement, you will hear a tone signifying that it is your turn to speak. You will have 20 seconds to record each response. You should respond as fully and as appropriately as possible. When you are ready to begin, select the Continue button.

You will have a conversation with Masao Yamada, a store manager, about a part-time job.

### Speaking Part Directions: Cultural Perspective Presentation

Imagine that you are making an oral presentation to your Japanese class. First, you will read and hear the topic for your presentation. You will have 4 minutes (standard time) to prepare your presentation. Then you will have 2 minutes (standard time) to record your presentation. Your presentation should be as full as possible.

You will now begin this part.

Select **Continue** to go on.



**Directions:** Imagine that you are making an oral presentation to your Japanese class. First, you will hear and read the topic for your presentation. The time you will have to prepare your presentation is indicated on the clock. You will then have 2 minutes to record your presentation. Your presentation should be as complete as possible.

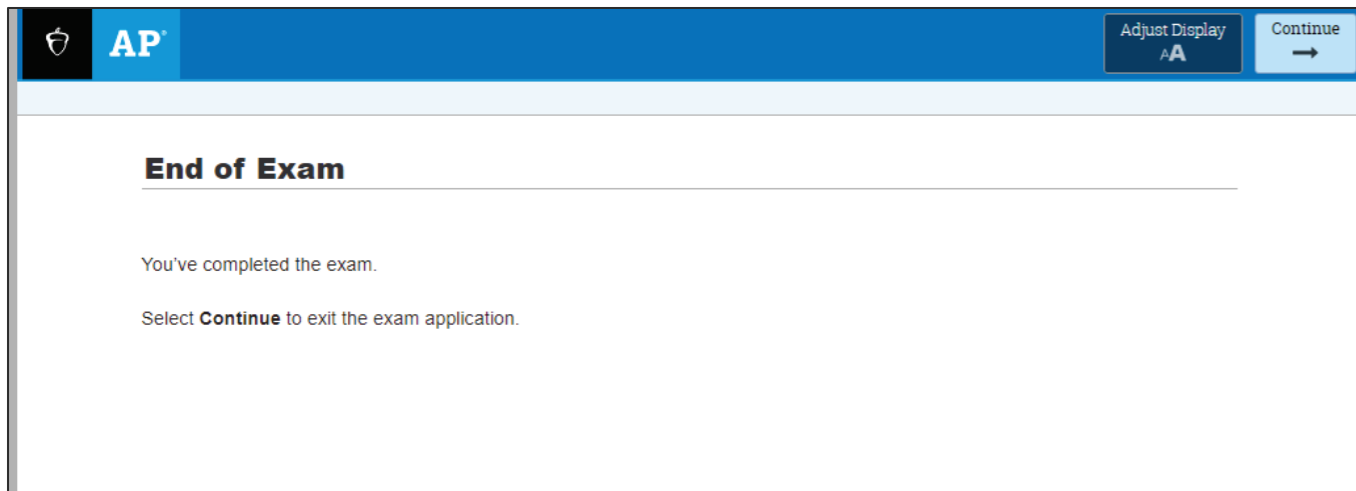
Present your own view or perspective on Japanese meal customs. Discuss at least FIVE aspects or examples of Japanese meal customs.

Begin with an appropriate introduction, give details, explain your own view or perspective, and end with a concluding remark.

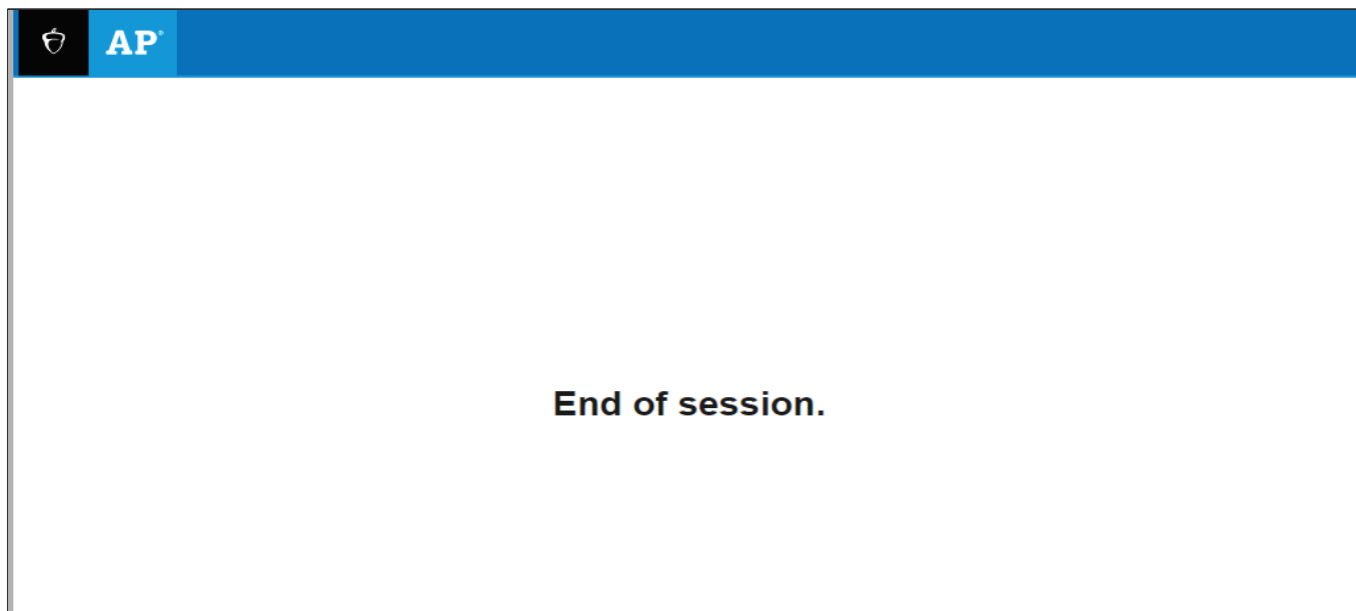
