Question 4 Argument Essay

Note: Student samples are quoted verbatim and may contain spelling and grammatical errors.

Overview

The intent of this question was to assess student's understanding of the sources of popular support for transitions to authoritarian regimes using one or more of the following course concepts: economic development, political stability, or civil society. Students were expected to articulate a defensible claim/thesis and establish a line of reasoning using one or more of the concepts provided; support the thesis with relevant evidence from a course country; use reasoning to explain why the evidence provided supports the thesis; and respond to an alternative perspective using refutation, concession, or rebuttal. Students were expected to write an argumentative essay, demonstrating each of the skills mentioned above. In particular, students needed to demonstrate their understanding of the relationship between popular support and authoritarian transitions by indicating the causal mechanisms, using the course concepts to establish the link. Students further needed to demonstrate their knowledge of the course countries by providing appropriate evidence from these countries that involve course concepts the students used in their thesis. Students also needed to be able to demonstrate their understanding of how the evidence they described was linked to the relationship between authoritarian transitions and popular support. Finally, students needed to demonstrate their understanding of alternative explanations by describing an alternative thesis and then either refuting that thesis, rebutting it, or conceding it.

- (a) The response earned 1 point for a thesis establishing a clear line of reasoning, by stating, "A regime change towards authoritarian would not be supported by the citizens as authoritarian regimes often limit civil society, leading to disatisfied citizens and less political stability."
- (b) The response earned 2 points for supporting the thesis with two pieces of evidence from one or more of the course countries related to the topic and course concept. It earned 1 point for stating, "Putin has trended the country towards authoritarianism with the disruption of free speech, fair elections, and limiting civil society groups." It earned 1 point for stating, "These disatisfactions with the ever increasing authoritarian nature of Iran led to the Green Movement, protests that occurred after an election was thought to be unfair by the population."
- (c) The response earned 1 point for using reasoning to explain why the thesis is supported by the evidence by stating, "This resistance towards authoritarianism is natrual, as citizens desire civil society, which can only fully exist with free speech and political participation."
- (d) The response earned 1 point for establishing an alternative line of reasoning, by stating that "the government of China has had widespread support of the people though being increasingly

authoritarian. This is due mainly to the amazing and rapid growth of the Chinese economy." It then rebuts this line of reasoning: "China is also a special case, as it has been a very longstanding authoritarian regime, with extremely potent propaganda and censorship of media and news," supported by "the citizens do not oppose authoritarian change, though in most other cases they would."

- (a) The response earned 1 point for a thesis with a clear line of reasoning, for stating, "An authoritarianism regime change would be supported by citizens who want economic development and political stability as authoritarian policy making is quick and powerful."
- (b) The response earned 2 points for supporting the claim with two pieces of evidence from one or more of the course countries related to the topic and course concept. It earned 1 point for stating, "China is an authoritarian regime who spurred rapid economic development through implementation of neo-liberal economic policy ... The neo-liberal economic reforms swiftly brought extreme economic development through efficient authoritarian rule." The response earned 1 point for stating, "Russia, despite starting out as a democratic regime, gave into authoritarianism due to the political stability it offered ... Putin's nationalization of the energy sector and subsequent expansion to the welfare system brought much needed political stability."
- (c) The response did not earn a point for reasoning because no line of reasoning is established beyond the evidentiary points.
- (d) The response did not earn a point for responding to an opposing or alternate perspective. It attempts to establish an alternative line of reasoning but does not rebut, refute, or concede this alternative.

(a) The response did not earn a point for developing a thesis with a line of reasoning because it does not reference a relevant course concept. The response offers a sentence resembling a thesis: "If a person's starving, the big man who says he can provide bread in exchange for being all powerful starts to sound like a good deal," but this provision of bread is not linked to either political stability or economic development.

- (b) The response earned 2 points for supporting the thesis with two pieces of evidence from one or more of the course countries related to the topic and course concept. It earned 1 point for stating, "Following rapid marketization and the fall of the USSR, the Russian economy was an absolute shambles ... since then, he [Putin] has been able to maintain a decent economy, and because of this he's been popular, which has allowed him to amass more power and remain in office." It also earned 1 point for stating, "The Chinese absolutely trample over civil liberty, but they remain in power, as over the last few decades they have become leaders in the global economy."
- (c) The response did not earn a point for explaining its reasoning because it does not have a workable thesis.
- (d) The response did not earn a point offering an alternative perspective because it does not have a workable thesis and offers no rebuttal, concession, or refutation of an alternative perspective.
