#### **Question 4**

#### **Overview**

This Argument Essay question expected responses to demonstrate an understanding of the concept of participatory democracy and apply that to interest groups or social movements as the best reflection of participatory democracy.

Responses should have demonstrated an understanding of foundational documents related to the concept of participatory democracy (*Federalist No.* 10, First Amendment to the United States Constitution, and "Letter from a Birmingham Jail"), while taking a position on the topic of the prompt. Responses were expected to articulate a defensible claim/thesis and establish a line of reasoning; support the thesis with evidence from a foundational document(s) and/or the course concepts; use reasoning to explain why the evidence provided supports the thesis; and respond to an alternative perspective using refutation or rebuttal.

Sample: 4A Score: 6

Claim/Thesis: 1 Evidence: 3 Reasoning: 1

Alternative Perspectives: 1

A. The response earned 1 point for the thesis. The response makes the argument that "it is actually social movements." The argument is supported by the line of reasoning of "b/c of its ability to gather a widespread influence that allows people to participate."

- B. The response earned 3 points for evidence. This response uses two pieces of specific and relevant evidence to support the claim or thesis. First, the response states that "The First Amendment of the United States Constitution it states that people have the right to protest, free speech, & the freedom of expression. These are all freedoms that are required for a participatory democracy b/c everyone needs to be able to spread their ideals or protest against certain things in order for people to stay active in the democracy." The response earned two points for providing a piece of evidence from the prompt and connecting the evidence to their thesis. The response earned the third evidence point by using a second piece of evidence. The response states "Another piece of evidence to support this is the 'letter from a Birmingham jail' which was written by Martin Luther King Jr. This letter helped pick up traction to the civil rights movement ... led to the passing of the civil rights act of 1964."
- C. The response earned 1 point for reasoning. This response explains how or why the evidence supports an argument relevant to the prompt. The response states "This shows that social movements can even push the government to pass acts such as these which clearly exemplifies a participatory democracy" and "These freedoms are the key to social movements b/c social movements often go against common views so they need right to free speech & protest which allows them to participate in democracy b/c they are expressing their view for change in the government." Either of the examples alone are sufficient for the response to have earned the point.

#### **Question 4 (continued)**

D. The response earned 1 point for the alternative perspective. The response states the alternative perspective that "Some may say however, that interest groups reflect the participartory model of democracy better b/c of its ability to have a concentrated idea to push to the government." The response refutes that perspective by stating "Although this may be true interest groups are not as widespread as social movements due to their small concentration. Social movements really show that a large quantity of people believe in something which allows not only more people to be active in democracy but to have more change in the government."

Sample: 4B Score: 3

Claim/Thesis: 0 **Evidence: 2** Reasoning: 1

**Alternative Perspectives: 0** 

A. The response earned 0 points for the thesis. The response does not make a claim/thesis that responds to the prompt. While the response does state that "Interest groups and social movements better reflect the participatory model of democracy," this does not respond to the prompt with a defensible claim as it did not clearly present an argument with a line of reasoning.

- B. The response earned 2 points for evidence. The response provides two pieces of evidence relevant to the prompt: "In the 1st amendment of the U.S. Constitution, it guarantees the right to protest, organization, speech, religion, and press" and "In 'Letter from a Birmingham Jail' by Martin Luther King Jr., he writes about how it is important that the Civil Rights Movement stands together and to protest non-violently to let the government know that there issues in the nation." The response did not earn the thesis point and therefore could not earn the third evidence point.
- C. The response earned 1 point for reasoning. The response states "Through the actions of a social movement, more people were able to vote creating a more participatory model of democracy!" This is sufficient because it explains how or why the evidence supports an argument relevant to the prompt.
- D. The response earned 0 points for alternate perspective. The response did not earn the thesis point and therefore earned 0 points for the alternative perspective.

A. The response earned 1 point for the thesis. The response makes the argument that "Social movements are a better reflection of participatory democracy." The argument is supported by the line

of reasoning of "as it states the opinion of the people and not a secret agenda." This is sufficient because the response makes a defensible claim with a line of reasoning.

- B. The response earned 0 points for evidence. While the response mentions the "First amendment" and the "tenth Fededalist paper," it does not provide information about either document that is relevant to the topic of the prompt.
- C. The response earned 0 points for reasoning. The response does not explain the relationship between the evidence provided and an argument.
- D. The response earned 0 points for the alternative perspective. The response does not provide an alternative perspective.
