Score Rationale

This portfolio earned a score of 5 because the written evidence clearly identifies materials, processes, and ideas for each work. The writing describes the use of salvaged and recycled materials, such as industrial trash bags, newspaper, and plastic, alongside processes like crocheting, sewing, stuffing, gluing, and sculpting. The ideas are conceptually rich and consistently reinforced through the writing, including phrases like "a surreal depiction of our current obstacle with microplastics" and "exploring the link between homelessness and plastic waste." These statements reflect both the artist's intent and the broader social commentary behind each piece. Across all five works, the written evidence clearly explains how the materials and processes relate to the underlying conceptual focus on environmental degradation and plastic pollution.

3-D Art and Design Skills

Visual evidence of advanced 3-D skills.

This portfolio earned a score of 5 because the visual evidence demonstrates advanced 3-D skills across all works. The artist uses unconventional materials and processes—such as recycled plastic, newspaper, and textile techniques—to create structurally complex and conceptually rich forms. Works 1 and 5 display a highly developed use of texture, integrating materials like crocheted plastic to achieve both tactile and visual depth. In Work 4, form and mass are resolved through an inventive use of transparent plastic to construct a functional, large-scale chair that successfully occupies physical space. Works 2 and 3 show ingenuity through the integration of 2-D imagery with 3-D elements, creating rhythm and movement that guide the viewer's experience across and beyond the surface. Across the portfolio, spatial decisions regarding occupied and unoccupied space are intentional and refined. Throughout the portfolio, the works demonstrate a high level of control over volume, balance, proportion, and occupied/unoccupied space.

Materials, Processes, and Ideas

Visual relationships among materials, processes, and ideas are evident and demonstrate synthesis.

This portfolio earned a score of 5 because visual relationships among materials, processes, and ideas are evident and demonstrate synthesis across all works. Each selected piece presents intentional material choices and construction methods that reinforce the conceptual focus on environmental impact and plastic waste. In Work 2, the artist reshapes plastic and applies paint to create a self-portrait that merges 2-D and 3-D approaches. The transformation of everyday waste into layered dimensional forms reflect a synthesis of sculptural and painterly processes. Work 5 reinforces the portfolio's conceptual

foundation by addressing the responsibility to reduce waste. The use of recycled materials, such as hundreds of plastic grocery bags, communicates the idea while forming a cohesive visual language. Across the portfolio, the integration of found materials, construction processes, and conceptual intent consistently supports the underlying message, resulting in a high level of synthesis.

Summary

This portfolio earned a score of 5 because it demonstrates advanced achievement across all three scoring criteria. The written evidence clearly identifies materials, processes, and ideas, offering conceptually rich statements that align with each work's construction and intent. Descriptions of salvaged materials, layered processes, and socially conscious themes, such as plastic pollution and environmental responsibility, are specific and meaningful. The visual evidence demonstrates advanced 3-D skills, with confident control over volume, mass, structure, and spatial relationships. Sculptural forms are wellconstructed, balanced, and spatially resolved, often using unconventional materials in inventive ways. The visual relationships among materials, processes, and ideas demonstrate synthesis, as each work integrates conceptual intent with material selection and physical construction. Across the portfolio, technical skill and conceptual clarity reinforce one another, aligning with the expectations for a holistic score of 5.
