My Art Is About Who I Am: I am many things but at the core, I am a weaving of family memories. I am the sum total of my family. For my concentration, I went back to my childhood. Some of my earliest childhood memories are at my grandparent's lake cottage. I painted these. These formative years with my extended family shaped me into who I am today; filled with happiness. After originally starting my concentration by water coloring photographs from a family photo album, I began to notice a pattern; stripes. These stripes evolved abstractly into meaning family and unity. I experimented with these stripes, making weaving and collages directly from the paintings, and noticed that a yarn ball is very similar to them and what they mean to me and my work. Through my art pieces, I have discovered how my family memories have knit me together and made me who I am, and how they determine where I find my meaning and truth in life.



Scoring Criteria

Row C: Materials, Processes, and Ideas – Score: 2

Visual relationships among materials, processes, OR ideas are evident.

Score Rationale

Visual relationships among materials, processes, OR ideas are evident. Described as a "weaving of family memories," the student artist identifies childhood memories in the written statement and creates visual relationships between the reproduction of photographs to weaving watercolored paper culminating in the symbolic woven relationships of layered memories that form identity. Using watercolor to mimic photo reproductions, the student began portfolio development with a literal interpretation of memories. Although these reproduced photographs are repeated throughout, image 10 contains a striped shirt that is a catalyst for inquiry development. Image 11 is an abstract striped painting that leads to Image 12, "Experimenting. Trying to weave together cut up paintings as the strings that make up who I am" in image 12. Image 14 showcases the student idea board, and image 15 is a culmination of ideas (student memories) through the weaving (process) of cut-up watercolor paintings (materials). By image 15, visual relationships of materials and ideas are evident, and the processes merging the two are evolving. With more time and development, the portfolio would most likely move to the score point of 3.
